Church	Route and distance to next church	Points of interest
Ashbrittle, St John the Baptist	Leaving the church and facing the Green, turn left (heading West) out of the village. Descend past Chackeridge Farm to the bridge over the river Tone and Stawley Mill. Continue to T Junction. Turn left, signposted Bathealton 1¼; Kittisford 2. Just after Stawley village sign, keeping Court Place Farm on your left, go round left bend. 30 yards on the left is the lane to Stawley church. 1½ miles.	Ashbrittle church yard has an ancient yew tree mentioned in the Doomsday Book. Toilets may be available in the Village Hall, as yet unconfirmed.
Stawley, St Michael and All Angels	Go back to Court Place Farm. Take left turn signposted Bathealton; Kittisford. After 1 mile, turn left signposted Bathealton ½; Wiveliscombe 3¾. Bathealton church will be ahead of you in half a mile. 1¾ miles.	Largely 13 th century with furnishing from the 18 th century – box pews, altar rails and a pulpit with a domed tester.
Bathealton, St Bartholomew	Leaving Bathealton by the same route as you entered, go back half a mile to the signpost. Turn left signposted Kittisford 1; Langford Budville 2¾. After 0.3 miles, heading downhill you take an unmarked right turn which it is easy to miss! Continue past the village sign and Kittisford church is on your right. 1½ miles.	Teas and Toilets available in village hall.

Kittisford. St Nicholas



Leaving Kittisford by the same route as you entered, return to the T Junction. Turn right signposted Langford Budville; Greenham. Go down the hill and take the bridge over the River Tone (note the Ford to your left). Continue straight on signposted Thorne St Margaret 11/4; Greenham. You will pass Cothay Manor Gardens. Take a left turn shortly after, signposted Thorne St Margaret 3/4. Passing through a wood, you will reach a T junction. Turn left. Continue along this road, passing Thorne Manor on your left and the church of **Thorne St Margaret** is ahead of you on the left.

Church contains unusual internal pillars made of wood imitating more commonly found stone.

Thorne St Margaret; St Margaret of Antioch



Leave the village by the same way you entered, continuing straight on (ignore turning to Cothay) for 3/4 mile. Turn right at a junction where the road you need is un-signposted (although the other roads are marked). Continue along this road keeping straight on at the next junction signposted Greenham 1/2; Ashbrittle 2 (ignore right hand turning to Cothay). Glimpses of Greenham Hall on the right are worth noting. At the T Junction by Greenham Barton turn right signposted Greenham. Greenham the church is soon on

your left.

The font dates from Saxon times and being more than 1000 years old, is one of the oldest in this area.

Church open 10-5 today.

Greenham, St Peter



Turn left out of the church, over the river Tone. Start your ascent passing the drive to Greenham Hall on your left and further on Appley Pavilion. In Appley itself you could turn right to the Globe Inn (for well earned refreshment!) although our route continues past this turning. You remain on this road all the way to Ashbrittle, passing through the hamlet of Tracebridge and your fourth crossing of the River Tone.
